EARLY FORD V-8 REGIONAL GROUP #23 BOARD OF DIRECTORS MINUTES, January 23, 2020

The meeting was brought to order by President Chuck McVey at 6:10 p.m. at Shari's Restaurant in the Spokane Valley, Washington.

Board of Directors in attendance: Chuck McVey, Chris Hughes, Dawn Voelker, Don Leidel, Dale Furnish, Dave Voelker and John Clarizio.

Absent: B.J. Glander, Norma Skidmore, Jackie Feldmiller and Ken Dickson.

Active members in attendance: Bob Long.

President's Report: Chuck McVey told the board that he plans on holding the position of president for only one year. The by-laws state that the position can be held for either one or two years so this should not be a problem. John Clarizio thought this may be more desirable to members in the future to only hold the office for one year. Bob Long said that sometimes it takes until the second year to fully understand the position of president, but understands both sides of one or two year terms. Don Leidel said he didn't see any problem with one year. John Clarizio said that maybe we should look into changing the by-laws to require the vice-president to move into the president position.

Treasurer's Report: Jackie Feldmiller was absent. She is still under the weather from her recent surgery. She is still keeping up with paying bills and depositing money.

Committee Reports:

Tours: Chris Hughes reported that the sleigh ride and dinner at the Western Pleasure Guest Ranch will be on Sunday, February 16th. The cost per person is \$66.55 which includes the ride, meal, tax and gratuity. Members will be asked to pay \$35/person for adults and \$15/person for children at the door. Chris needs to have a head count by February 10th.

Swap Meet: Bob Long brought the swap meet flyer cards to show the board and asked if they thought he was going in the right direction with the smaller flyers. The whole board thought they looked great. Bob is still working on getting a sponsor for the back of the card. It was suggested by Dale Furnish that the sponsor could use the card as a marketing ploy with possibly giving a discount for car parts or when buying a used car.

Christmas Party: We need to get the cost down for our Christmas party. This year it cost the club

approximately \$86/person at the Mirabeau. John Clarizio and Dale Furnish stated that they knew of two other groups that had their party at the Mirabeau who paid about \$50/person. Dale Furnish reminded the board that if the club no longer has the swap meet, our income would be substantially less and we would not be able to pay what we have in the past for parties. Chuck McVey stated that the Event Center behind Darcy's in the Valley offers events for \$40/person that are just as nice as what we had at the Mirabeau. Bob Long asked if the club should start asking the members to pay for part of their meal. John Clarizio said that other clubs ask their members to contribute to the cost. Chuck McVey stated that he would like to do what the Dukes do and have donated gifts for each person that comes. Dale said that we may have a hard time getting people to go around asking for donations from businesses. Dale asked if Norma Skidmore was going to chair the Christmas party again. If not, someone needs to be put in place to start planning early. Chris Hughes said that the venue probably needs to be booked in February.

Old Business: A dues increase was voted on by the board in 2018 and was supposed to be implemented beginning January 1, 2020. Nothing was brought to regular membership about this proposal. Chuck McVey will bring up a dues increase from \$20 to \$30 beginning January 1, 2021 at the next regular meeting.

Chuck Little is still working on selling the swap meet and we may not know anything until May.

New Business: All members of our club also need to be a member of the National Early Ford V-8 Club of America. John Clarizio asked why. Dale Furnish said that it provides our club with insurance to protect the BOD members. Dawn Voelker asked how is it reconciled to know that our members have paid National dues and if every member does not pay, does that void our insurance? Chuck said that he is going to call the National club and get some questions answered.

The Next Board of Directors meeting will be on Thursday, March 19th at Shari's Restaurant in the Spokane Valley at 6:00.

A motion to adjourn the meeting was made by Don Leidel and seconded by Chris Hughes. Motion passed.



The Soybean Car

In the early 1940s, Henry Ford experimented with making plastic parts for automobiles. These experiments resulted in what was described as a "plastic car made from soybeans." Although this automobile never made it into the museum's collections, it remains a good example of innovative desian.

The soybean car was a prototype car built with agricultural plastic. In 1941, the New York Times stated that the car body and fenders were made from a strong material derived from soy beans, wheat and corn. The body was lighter making it more fuel efficient than a normal metal body. It was made in Dearborn, Michigan, through the work of scientist/ botanist George Washington Carver. It was partially made because of the rationing of steel during World War II and it was designed to run on hemp.

Henry Ford first put Eugene Turenne Gregorie of his design department in charge of manufacturing it. Henry was not satisfied with the proposed project, and eventually gave it to the Soybean Laboratory in Greenfield Village. Lowell Overly, who had a background in tool and die design, became the person in charge. The finished prototype was exhibited in 1941 at the Dearborn Days festival in Dearborn, Michigan. Ford proclaimed he would "grow automobiles from the soil" however it never happened, even though he had over 12,000 acres of soybeans for experimentation.

American History, Alive in Stone

Mount Rushmore National Memorial is a massive sculpture carved into Mount Rushmore in the Black Hills region of South Dakota. Completed in 1941 under the direction of Gutzon Borglum and his son Lincoln, the sculpture's roughly 60-ft.-high granite faces depict U.S. presidents George Washington, Thomas Jefferson, Theodore Roosevelt and Abraham Lincoln.

The workers had to endure conditions that varied from blazing hot to bitter cold and windy. Each day they climbed 700 stairs to the top of the mountain to punch-in on the time

clock. Then 3/8 inch thick steel cables lowered them over the front of the 500 foot face of the mountain in a "bosun chair". Some of the workers admitted being uneasy with heights, but during the Depression, any job was a good job. https://www.nps.gov/moru/learn/historyculture/carving-history.htm



LOOK TO THE SKIES FOR DAWN

Do you remember the White Ghost? . . . Or the Red Devil?

Only a few years ago, when automobiles were risky and freakish playthings, those were names to conjure with—phantom machines that dashed at forty miles an hour along graded dirt roads, followed by pillars of dust and fumes of oil, pursued by frantic dogs and the derisive yells of village skeptics. Do you remember the epoch-making Glidden tours across a few hundred miles of New England hills? Do you remember the Vanderbilt Cup Races, with thousands of holiday-makers banked around dangerous curves, thrilled with the hope of seeing a smash-up?

Only a few years before that, horses were running wild and cattle stampeding at the hoarse shriek of the locomotive. . . .

And prayers were offered regularly for those in peril on the sea. . . .

Remember these things—for they happened in our time!

Today giant liners are ferrying hundreds of thousands of tourists across the oceans. Limited trains glide on roller

bearings, safeguarded at every turn of the wheel by automatic controls. And 22,000,000 automobiles have turned the thoughts of everyone in this country outward—outward along smooth highways of asphalt and concrete.

Now look to the skies for dawn!


A new industrial and commercial era is commencing, just as surely as new eras commenced with steamboats, with the railroad, and the automobile. Their dawns were marked with misgivings and catastrophes that befogged the popular vision. . . And similarly, the heroic recklessness that the hazards of war made necessary, the dramatic daring of pioneers trying their wings beyond the realms of known safety, the foolish adventures of unskilled fliers in obsolete machines have diverted public attention from what is going on in the solid, safe development of air transportation.

We will awake some early day to realize that a new and tremendous force has entered national life. It does not imply the obsolescence of old-established means of transportation. It means a sudden extension of the capabilities of man—the power to reach hitherto inaccessible spots unerringly and with great swiftness, a means of leaping geographical boundaries in perfect comfort and safety, another triumph over all-consuming Time.

Everyone is familiar with the spectacular achievements in aviation during the past year. Everyone has come to know names such as Le Bourget, Croydon, Tempelhof, Mineola, and the Ford Airport at Detroit—principally because of dramatic events associated with them. But not so many realize that in a recent survey of one hundred American flying concerns, there were only two fatalities in five million miles of flight.

The all-metal planes of the Ford Motor Company have already flown on regular schedules, carrying freight, a distance of 700,000 miles. . . . And it is in the well-founded belief that the airplane has brought in a new industrial factor of the first importance, that the Ford Motor Company is devoting resources to research, experimentation, and sound production in this new and rapidly expanding field.
